From the Principal


Dear Families and Friends,

Parent Information Night


Thank you to all parents who were able to attend our Parent Information Night this week. This was an opportune time for me and the staff to outline the direction of the school

School Messages

Student Learning Journals - SEE SAW App

To further improve communication of student learning with our parent community, the school has decided to trial the implementation of an APP titled "SEESAW". This decision was based on feedback from other Catholic Schools utilising this APP and the positive effect it was having on parent engagement with student learning.



SEESAW

SEESAW is a simple way for teachers and students to record and share what's happening in the classroom. SEESAW gives students a place to document their learning, be creative and learn how to use technology. Each student gets their own journal and will add things to it, like photos, videos, drawings, or notes. When there are new Seesaw posts, families can be notified via app notification, email or SMS.

It is extremely important for all parents to be aware that ONLY Parents are only notified about their own child's work, and all data is safe and secure. This learning journal is not open for comments or likes and is not shared with the rest of class community. It is merely a tool for students to be able to share their work & learning moments with their family. More information will be dispersed over the coming weeks. Please chat to your child's classroom teacher if you have any concerns.

Learning in Infants - Multiplication & Division Explained

In Kindergarten, from the NSW Syllabus it says:

A student groups, shares and counts collections of objects, describes them using everyday language, and records using informal methods

Students begin learning about Multiplication and Division in Kindergarten by using concrete materials (blocks, beads, counters etc) to show groups of the same size and then describe them using the mathematical language of *group*, *share*, *equal*. They begin to build the concept that fair sharing means all shares are equal. Once the objects are shared equally, the process is reversed to begin to develop the link between multiplication and division.

In Stage 1, from the NSW Syllabus it says:

A student uses a range of mental strategies and concrete materials for multiplication and division.

In Year One, in addition to continuing making and recording equal groups and division, students begin skip counting by 2's, 5's and 10's and using skip counting to find the total number of objects. The connection between multiplication and division is further developed. Students build on their use mathematical language using *number of groups, number in group, sharing, shared between, left over, total.*

In Year Two students model multiplication as repeated addition (3 groups of 4 is the same as 4+4+4) and division as repeated subtraction. Students use number lines and arrays to model multiplication and division. They use the language of add, take away, row, column, array, number of rows, number of columns, number in each row, number in each column, is the same as, shared equally, part left over, empty number line, number chart.

Learning in Primary - Multiplication & Division Explained

A question often asked by parents is 'Do they have to know their times tables?' It came up at our Parent Information Night this week so I thought it would be good to use the NSW Mathematics Syllabus to answer this common query. It states:

- Yr 3: Recall multiplication facts of two, three, five and ten and related division facts
- Yr 4: Recall multiplication facts up to 10×10 and related division facts
- Yr 5: Solve problems involving multiplication of large numbers by one- or two-digit numbers using efficient mental and written strategies and appropriate digital technologies
- Yr 6: select and use efficient mental and written strategies, and digital technologies, to multiply whole numbers of up to four digits by one- and two-digit numbers

So, the answer is YES. Students are expected to learn their 'times tables' or as we call them today, multiplication facts. The difference is HOW we want the students to learn them, and that is with a deep, conceptual understanding of multiplication and division, eg. what each fact looks like with concrete materials, multiplication and division are 'inverse' operations (they are the reverse of each other), knowing one set of facts can assist you with other related facts, eg. 4×8 can be solved by doubling 4×4 .

Much of the content in mathematics which you were taught at school school are still in our syllabus today with the difference in being HOW it is taught. If you wish to see a maths lesson in action, please make contact with either myself or your child's teacher.

Classroom Learning - Stage 1

Firstly, we would like to congratulate Stage 1 on the wonderful start they have made to the year. Their settled behaviour has been mentioned by staff on several occasions and we are very proud of them all!

In Science, we are kicking off the year with our unit 'To Get To The Other Side'. We have been studying bridges and gathering data on what materials they are made of, and asking ourselves why so many bridges are made of a certain material, and not others.

We are learning that all materials can be changed and combined to meet a variety of purposes. We've also been on a hunt in the classroom to find objects that are made from one material only, and some that are made by combining different materials.

When asked : "What data is?" **Ash** explained that data just means information.

Georgia thinks that metal and steel are great for building bridges because its strong and you can make it into lots of different shapes.

Marlie wants to visit Australia's oldest bridge, Richmond Bridge in Tasmania, to see the old stone close up.

Stage 1 gathered and recorded their data on what bridges are made of. They then presented and interpreted their findings, just like scientists do.

Social & Emotion Well being

During our Friendship groups we have been learning about Empathy. The aim of our session was to understand what empathy is and how our reactions and responses impact others.

Empathy involves a *cognitive* aspect of imagining other people's perspectives and worldviews, and an *emotional* aspect of feeling compassion and concern for them. Empathy is not innate, we learn it. Children learn empathy largely from their parents, but also from teachers and other adult role models.

How can we help our children develop empathy?

- Reading can be a powerful way for children to learn empathy, especially reading together with parents for young children as it helps them empathise with unfamiliar experiences and emotions. For some great books visit: www.readings.com.au/news/childrens-books-that-teach-empathy
- Help them build their emotional vocabulary and encourage them to discuss and explain emotions they may be unfamiliar with or otherwise have difficulty putting into words.
- Teach them about diversity through exposure to different cultures, beliefs and practices as this can help reduce prejudice and discrimination. Learning more about those around us and their personal experiences helps to build tolerance and empathy.
- Giving children the opportunity to care for a plant or pet can help them understand the value and worth of all living things.
- Develop an awareness of the people who are connected to our lives but hidden from view. eg. Who made the clothes we are wearing?
- Children learn from what they see, so as adults we need to model the kind of tolerant and empathetic behaviour that we'd like to see in our children.

Empathy is an integral part of Social and Emotional Learning (SEL). This involves learning to understand and manage our emotions, establish positive relationships, develop empathy for others, set and achieve goals and feel good about ourselves.
